

Step Twelve

Having had a spiritual awakening as a result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to addicts, and to practice these principles in all our affairs.

My sponsor and the friends I have made in recovery have been willing to help me unconditionally to stay clean and sober. They seemed genuinely excited to carry the message that the program works and were happy that I was doing well. They also empathize with my struggles in life and offer support for my issues such as the difficulties with my marriage, work, health, and finances. The fundamental message of recovery is that anyone can get clean and sober, lose the desire to drink and drug and find a new way to live. It is a paradox of our sobriety to consider that we can only keep what we have found in the program by giving it away to others. The more I try to give away what was freely given to me, the more I appreciate my own recovery. When I began to work Step 12, my focus shifted to the service work of helping others. I can help the newcomers by reaching out and welcoming them to the meetings and encouraging them to keep coming back. I try to introduce these newcomers to other members so they can get to know them too. Hopefully they will feel welcome and more comfortable at meetings. I also frequently offer to exchange phone numbers with newcomers explaining that using the phone and calling others in recovery has been important to my success. I tried to call them just to say hello and let them know it was nice to meet them. I also direct newcomers to other meetings, especially meetings that I go to or meetings that might be convenient for them.

Tradition Twelve

Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our Traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.

Many of us choose a home group, letting other home group members know about our decision to join and trying our best to attend that meeting regularly. Many home group members participate in the group conscience meetings to decide how to allocate contributions collected and other decisions such as group format. These monthly group conscience meetings are the collective conscience of those that attend to discuss old and new business of the group. Occasionally homegroups will conduct a group inventory to evaluate how well the Fifth Tradition is being emphasized by the group, that is, how well the group is carrying the message to the still suffering individuals. I feel a special connection with other homegroup members and count on their ongoing attendance and support. Having a service position at my homegroup strengthens my sense of contribution. This can include being the chairperson, treasurer, greeter, coffee maker or any other assigned positions to carry out functions needed for a well-organized meeting. Everyone is equal at the meeting regardless of homegroup status, sobriety date, service position or sponsorship status. We learn to practice principals including anonymity, honesty, patience, tolerance, and humility with everyone at our home group whether we like them or not. We might not like everyone, but we learn to love them as homegroup members.
